Make a Roller Skating Ralph Passport

Directions for Assembly

- 1. Print the Roller Skating Ralph Passport page
- 2. Instruct students to fold the page on the middle line vertically (as shown on the diagram below.)



- 3. Open the page and flatten.
- 4. Instruct students to fold the page on the middle line horizontally (as shown on the diagram below.)



5. While the paper is still folded, fold the top edge toward the folded edge. Flip entire paper over. Fold the bottom edge toward the folded edge(as shown on the diagram below.)





Folded edge

- 6. Unfold the top and the bottom. The paper should still be folded in the middle horizontally.
- 7. Cut on the dotted line. (The cut is only in the middle of the paper.)




8. Open and flatten the paper again. Fold vertically down the middle. Pop out the two sides and fold so that there are four pages. (See diagram below.)

































Using a Compass Rose





Climate

Average winter temperatures range from 32° F to 46° F and average summer temperatures from 61° F to 75° F. For the most warmth and sunshine go to the south of the country. The Provence and Languedoc regions are characterized by mild winters and blisteringly hot summers.

Open Air Markets

Most towns and large villages have a large market once a week; but in larger towns, markets may take place twice a week, or even every day. Typical French markets are a mix between the farmers' market and a traders' market, with stalls offering local produce straight from the farm standing alongside fruit and vegetable stalls, cheese stalls and other stalls offering a full range of produce. Even in Paris, fruit and vegetable markets can be found in every district of the city.

Louvre Museum

Louvre Museum or French Musée du Louvre national museum and art gallery of France is a part of a large palace in Paris that was built on the right-bank site of the 12th-century fortress of Philip Augustus. It is the world's most-visited art museum with a collection that spans work from ancient civilizations to the mid-19th century including Leonardo da Vinci's Mona Lisa (c.1503–19).






Eiffel Tower


The plan to build a tower 300 metres high was conceived as part of preparations for the World's Fair of 1889. Emile Nouguier and Maurice Koechlin, the two chief engineers in Eiffel's company, had the idea for a very tall tower in June 1884. It was to be designed like a large pylon with four columns of lattice work girders, separated at the base and coming together at the top, and joined to each other by more metal girders at regular intervals. In order to make the project more acceptable to public opinion, Nouguier and Koechlin commissioned the architect Stephen Sauvestre to work on the project's appearance. The construction work began in January 1887 and was finished on March 31, 1889. The Eiffel tower is France's symbol in the world and the showcase of Paris. Today it welcomes almost 7 million visitors a year.

Fountain of Trevi



Facts

- The Fountain of Trevi is one of th oldest water sources in Rome.
- Nicola Salvi, a native Roman, won the rights to design the fountain after competing in a contest held by Pope Clemens XII in 1730.
- The Fountain of Trevi is mostly made of travertine, the same material as the Colosseum.

Vatican City



- Vatican City is the home of the Pope, the head of the Roman Catholic Church.
- Vatican City is the smallest country in the world at just over 100 acres.
- The Sistine Chapel's ceiling was painted by Michelangelo and is located in the Apostolic Palace.

Colosseum




- The Colosseum was built between 72
 A.D. and 80 A.D under the Emperor
 Vespasian.
- The Colosseum is the largest amphitheater in the world.
- The Colosseum had 80 entrances and could seat approximately 50,000 spectators.

The Blue Grotto



- The Blue Grotto is a sea cave on the coast of the Italian island of Capri.
- Sunlight passes through an underwater cavity creating a blue reflection that lights up the cavern of the Blue Grotto.
- The Blue Grotto was formed by wave action of the sea eroding the limestone rock of the cavern walls.
